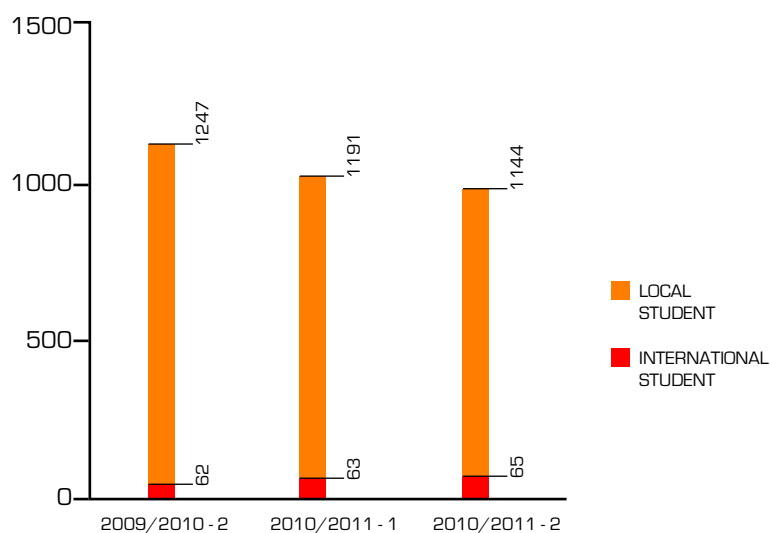
The table below shows the number of graduates obtaining first class in major convocation on 43rd and 45th convocation. The number has increase from 22% on 43rd convocation to 29.97% on 45th convocation. This was due to the Faculty effort by monitoring students' performance through their academic advisors and to encourage students to involve with academic enhancement programmes such as discussions, information sharing and internationalization activities .

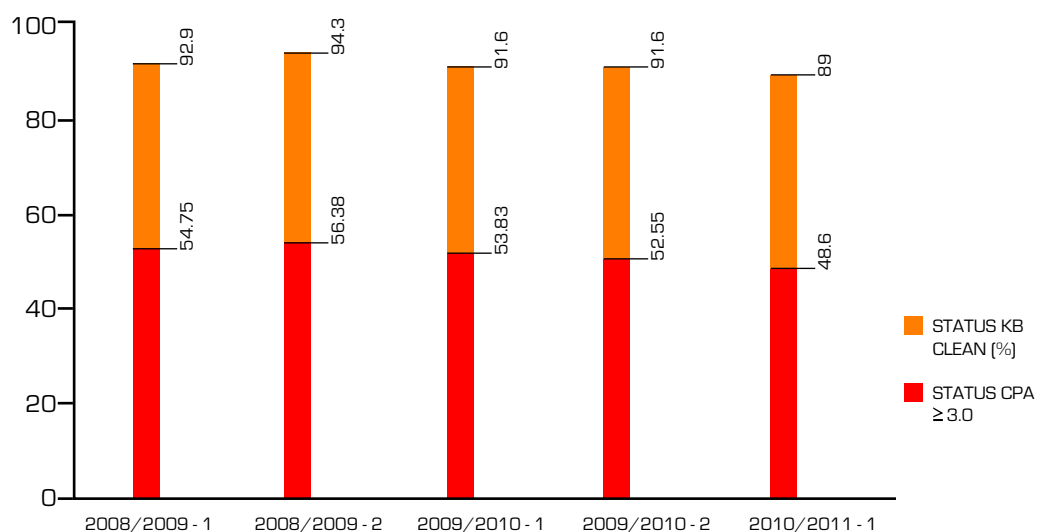
The graph below shows the enrolment of undergraduates until 2010. There was a decrease in the number of student intake from the year 2009 to 2010. This was due to the University's policy to maintain good staff-student ratio for undergraduates and to balance the number of undergraduates and postgraduate students.

However the result of GoT has decreased from 90.1% in the 2008/09-1 session to 87.9% in 2009/2010-1 session. There were students who did not graduate on time because of academic, health and disciplinary problems.

The Faculty has implemented the following measures to improve students to graduate on time (GoT):

1. Improve academic advisory system, including monitoring students' performances.
2. Review students' timetable and reduce the average credit hours per semester to about 16.
